Joint IRE/AIEE Committee to Discuss Inter-Society Cooperation.

Dr. Haggerty, IRE Representative to the Joint IRE/AIEE

Committee to Discuss Inter-Society Cooperation, presented

his report to the Executive Committee as follows:

"I met with Dr. B. R. Teare, Jr., Chairman of the AIEE Inter-Society Relations Committee (effective as of their new year - August 1, 1961), designated as such by President-Elect Chase and also, to act as the AIEE member in the Joint IRE/AIEE Committee to discuss Inter-Society Cooperation.

"I started by indicating that I was uninstructed as to the limitation of scope by the IRE Executive Committee with the specific aim thereby that I not be limited to discuss interests or relations on the basis of a gradual coordination of our mutual activities but could discuss, if it appeared desirable to do so, the actual merging of the two societies or the creation of a new society to take on all our activities.

"In summary, I suggested that we examine the two societies' problems by:

1. First determining whether indeed the needs of our profession were such that they would be met better by a single/society than by a coordination of the two societies.

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- 2. That if such were the case, that we begin our discussion by talking about how such a creation of such a new society might best be entered into, rather than by a listing and discussion of all of the practical difficulties which it would entail, even though these SUBSEQUERTY MAKE CREATION OF A NEW practical difficulties might indeed make solution unsuitable at SOCIETY ONTENABLE WHEN THEY WERE EXAMINED IN DETAIL the time when they are examined.
- 3. That the total number of man hours which would probably be required to create a satisfactory new society would probably be fewer and certainly take far less chronological time than would an attempt to coordinate our activies of mutual interest on a step by step basis.
- 4. I felt that it was probably unsound to discuss the matter on the basis of a five or ten year span because it appeared that the exigencies of our professional interests in the two societies were such that our overlaps and conflicts were probably at a minimum Now and, if each society did the job called for by their charters over the ten years, we would make it more difficult and would have more to conflicting entities/requiring resolution than we presently do.
- 5. IRE, it is true, has been growing at approximately 10,000 members per year against AIEE's approximately 2,000 members per year. IRE

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has reached membership of approximately 90,000 against the AIEE's approximately 65,000 members. The continued rate of increase of IRE versus AIEE is probably guaranted by the 17,000 Student members of IRE versus the 10,000 Student members which AIEE has.

- 6. IRE's income is somewhat more than double AIEE income.

 CONSIDERABLY

 IRE's physical assets are more than double those of AIEE.
- 7. AIDE is one of the Founder Societies and IRE must recognize this tie and make provision for it.
- 8. AIEE has obligations relating to the new United Engineering File Building, also AIEE has moral obligations to other societies, which must be taken into consideration.
- 9. We have somewhat different organizational plans including definite provision for broader span of international activities in IRE which must be included in any new organization.

in which the above outlined points were covered thoroughly, was
