

IEEE MOURNS ITS LOSS

Many employees of IEEE were deeply shocked and saddened by the death of Richard Evans, who was supervisor of the shipping department. AWARDS BOARD

The Awards Board, one of the standing Institute Committees reporting directly to the Board of Directors, administers the awards activities of the IEEE. It has the important and very pleasant duty of recognizing the achievements of outstanding engineers in the field of electrical and electronics engineering. This tremendous responsibility is assigned to seven committees reporting to the Awards Board and these committees recommend candidates for final approval by the Board of Directors.

There are a Medal of Honor and four Major Annual Awards: Edison Medal, Founders Award, Lamme Medal, and Education Medal. The selection of a recipient for the Medal of Honor (which is not awarded annually) is the sole responsibility of the entire Awards Board: The recommendations of candidates for the four Major Awards is the responsibility of the committees appointed for each of these awards.

The Field Awards Committee recommends candidates for seven awards: Harry Diamond Memorial Prize Award, William M. Habirshaw Award, Mervin J. Kelly Award, Morris E. Leeds Award, Morris N. Liebmann Memorial Prize Award, David Sarnoff Award and Vladimir K. Zworykin Prize Award; the Prize Papers Committee recommends candidates for the W. R. G. Baker Prize Award, the Browder J. Thompson Memorial Prize Aw Award and the Institute Student Prize Award; and the Scholarship Committee recommends candidates for the Volta Scholarship and the Fortescue Fellowship.

At Headquarters, Una B. Lennon, who was appointed Staff Secretary of the Awards Board upon the retirement of Mrs. Landres in April, and Miss Maureen P. Hoy, who joined IEEE on June 22, serve the committees in every way possible. They prepare copies of the nominations received for each of the above awards and these are circulated to the respective committees for review. The preparation of the dossiers for each committee entails a considerable amount of paper work, but it is interesting to note the amazing accomplishments of the candidates and their outstanding contributions to the profession. In addition to the preparation of the dossiers, they are responsible for attendance at the meetings of the Awards Board and its committees, preparation of the Minutes, preparation of the brochures, presentation of the awards at the appointed time and place and service to the Institute members in connection with the awards when requested. Their main endeavor is to lighten the work of the members serving on the committees who take time out of their busy schedules to serve the Institute in honoring outstanding engineers.

THE GOURMET

What is the mainstay of the cook with elegant taste -- and a less than elegant pocketbook? Chicken, of course! This month, a second chicken masterpiece, fit for the regalist royalty you know. What, you know no royalty? Nothing lost -- it's even fit for the king or queen of your heart.

> CHICKEN VERONIQUE (Chicken with Green Grapes)

1 broiler-fryer, 3-4 pounds, guartered 14 cup salad oil 1/4 cup unsifted all-purpose flour 13/4 teaspoons salt 3/4 teaspoon dried rosemary leaves ½ teaspoon poultry seasoning 1/4 teaspoon black pepper 1/4 teaspoon dried thyme leaves 1 clove garlic, crushed 1 bay leaf, crushed 11/4 cups canned clear chicken broth ½ cup chablis 3 cups seedless green grapes, halved (about 1½ pounds) Watercress sprigs, garnish

Wipe chicken with damp paper towels. In hot oil in large heavy skillet, brown chicken on all sides. Remove chicken and set aside. Take skillet off heat; stir in flour, salt, rosemary,

poultry seasoning, pepper, thyme, garlic, bay leaf, chicken broth, Don Madeya, a new member of the Shipping Dept., was mar- wine, and 1 cup grapes. Bring just to boiling, stirring. Add browned der -- about 45 minutes; turn occasionally. Then, with slotted spoon, lift out grapes and discard. Add remaining 2 cups of grapes; heat 5 minutes longer. Serve chicken with sauce poured over it. If your skillet is of the Corningware type, you may serve in it, as it comes off the heat. Garnish with watercress. Makes 2-3 servings, depending on appetites.

> For an especially gracious meal: with Chicken Veronique, provide one fresh artichoke for each person with individual cups melted lemon butter, and dinner rolls of the refrigerated-tube variety.

To serve 4-6, provide two 2½-pound chickens. The rest of the ingredients remain the same.

Teetotallers may replace \(\frac{1}{2} \) cup chablis with an equal amount more chicken broth. A touch of tartness is lost, but 'tis still a

Gourmets of the opposite persuasion may serve the remainder of the bottle of chablis, chilled, to sip during the meal.

The Greatest Gift


I am a gift the greatest gift of all gifts. From love and care bave I been freely given.

INVEST IN THE BLOOD BANK

The U.E.C. Employees Blood Bank, division of the American Red Cross Blood Bank, will be set up outside the computer room on the first floor, on Wednesday, September 29, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Employees of the IEEE are urged to donate.

Almost anyone in good health may donate blood. The process is painless, harmless, and takes only about one hour, including a medical screening of each donor checking temperature, pulse, blood pressure, and hemoglobin. And your body replenishes the amount of your donation in just about 24 hours.

The giving of blood is in fact a personal investment:
As long as you are employed with the United Engineering
Center, you are eligible to receive blood from its bank
whether you give or not; but you may receive the equivalent
of your donation free for yourself or for a loved one throughout your life. You receive a wallet certificate stating your
blood type and a record of your donations. This is indeed a
valuable savings account -- it can save your life.
