PHILADELPHIA SECTION - IRE

1. FOUNDATION

In order to place the formation of the Philadelphia Section in its proper perspective, it is desirable to trace briefly the overall progress made by the IRE in fostering local activities.

The Institute of Radio Engineers was established May 18, 1912 by a consolidation of the "Society of Wireless Telegraph Engineers", of Boston, and "The Wireless Institute" which had its headquarters in New York. The original membership of the IRE numbered 46, of whom 22 came from SWTE and 25 from TWI. (One of the charter members had belonged to both groups.) After a year of informal operation, the Institute was formally incorporated under the laws of the State of New York on August 23, 1913. Its expressed purposes were "To advance the art and science of radio transmission, to publish works of literature, science and art for such purpose, to do all and every act necessary, suitable and proper for the accomplishment of any of the purposes or the attainment of any of the powers herein set forth, either above or in association with other corporations, firms or individuals...".

Initial growth was rapid, and the activities of the IRE, originally confined to the New York Area, spread to other cities as membership increased. The first local Section was organized in Washington, D.C. in January 1914, followed by one in Boston, Mass. in November, 1914. Seattle, Washington was next in February, 1915, and a Section was organized in San Francisco in 1917. World War I interrupted the formation of local sections as well as other Institute activities, and it was not until 1925 that three additional Sections were formed in Philadelphia, Chicago and Toronto, Canada.

The initial meeting of the Chicago Section is reported in the August, 1925 issue of the "Proceedings", and the first meeting of the proposed Toronto (subsequently the Canadian) Section took place on September 25, 1925. The December, 1925 issue of the "Proceedings" lists the Philadelphia Section for the first time, with Stuart Ballantine as Chairman, but gives no information as to other officers, or date of organization. A report to the first national convention of the IRE held in New York on January 18-19, 1926m states that "During the year (1925) sections have been organized in Chicago, Philadelphia, and Toronto". It is not evident whether the order of listing is alphabetical or chronological, and it is uncertain, therefore, whether the Philadelphia Section preceded or followed the Canadian Section in organization. The latter group held its "inaugural banquet and get together meeting" in October 2, 1925.

No record has been found, either here or in the New York office of the IRE, as to when the Philadelphia Section was officially chartered, or of the members of the IRE who signed the petition for its formation. At that time, the by-laws of the Institute required the signatures of at least twenty-five members of any grade except Juniors or Students. Presumably, the required signatures must have been obtained largely from the list given in Appendix A, attached. This list, which has been abstracted from the 1926 Year Book, includes all members of the IRE above the grade of Juniors as of 1-1-26 with addresses in or near Philadelphia, and totals 53 names.

Apparently the Philadelphia Section was not particularly active during 1925 and early 1926. No reports of meetings have been found prior to May 21, 1926. This is described as a reorganization meeting, and was followed by a meeting on July 12, 1926 which attracted an audience of 100. Beginning in September, 1926, meetings were held regularly, and the Philadelphia Section was firmly launched.

PHILADELPHIA SECTION - IRE

34. OFFICERS OF SECTION

HISTORY OF THE PHILADELPHIA SECTION-IRE

A previous report, which was abstracted in the February 1954 issue of the Bulletin, covered the formation of the Philadelphia Section in late 1925 and its reorganization in May, 1926. In the fall of 1926 Mr. J. C. Van Horn was elected chairman, an office which he was to hold until June, 1930. This is the only instance in which the same man served as chairman for more than one year but, judging from the results, the policy was sound. In a little over four years, the infant Philadelphia Section had outstripped the older ones and was, at the end of 1930, the largest section in the country.

During most of Mr. Van Horn's term of office, Mr. J. C. Mevius served as Secretary, succeeding Mr. David P. Gullette, and much of the early history has been reconstructed from the "Section Notes" which these men contributed to the Proceedings. It is from these notes, for example, that we learn the names of the first membership committee, appointed in January 1927 - Messrs. S. J. Hutchinson, A. G. Shafer, and H. H. Brown.

Names of those important individuals, the program chairmen, have not been discovered. Perhaps there were none specifically designated. With or without them, however, meetings were held regularly - 10 in 1927, 8 in 1928, and 7 in 1929. Initially, these meetings were held at the Bartol Laboratories. Later, as attendance increased, many of them were held at the old Franklin Institute Lecture Hall on Seventh Street. Attendance, of course, varied over rather wide ranges, just as it does today. The minimum officially recorded is 15.7 However, one of the members in those early days recalls an occasion where the speaker, after surveying the handful of people who had turned out, remarked "Well, it's not enough for a formal paper, but it's just right for a crap game". That R. evening, there was no formal paper.

On the other hand, subjects which appealed to the members and their friends generally attracted surprisingly large audiences. Considering only attendance as a criterion, the following appear to have been the meetings in the 1927-1929 period which commanded wide attention. At all of these meetings the attendance exceeded 100, reaching a maximum of 275.
