

Not So Grrrrreat!

We all recognize Tony the Tiger, the friendly spokesanimal for Kellogg's Frosted Flakes[®]. He is a classic example of a nontraditional trademark. When we see Tony, we immediately think of his cereal.

Many of us also remember the "Put a tiger in your tank" advertising campaign by Exxon® and its predecessors. That tiger didn't have a name but was nearly as well known as Tony in his day. The promotion included furry tiger tails hanging from customers' gas caps. Although not as prominent lately, the Exxon tiger is still around.

These two trademarks peacefully coexisted for many years. Tony promoted his cereal; the Exxon tiger promoted gasoline. As you may recall from earlier columns in this space, trademarks are limited to the specific products on which they are used and to related products. Therefore, the same type of trademark can be used by different people on different products without any conflict.

As businesses expand, merge or otherwise move into new areas of products and services, they tend to expand their trademarks, too. This can create new conflicts between old trademarks. That's what happened to Kellogg and Exxon.

Exxon, somewhat belatedly, is converting its service stations into convenience marts. As with so many gas stations, racks of food products have replaced tiers of tires. Of course, some of those racks contain cereal, including Kellogg's Frosted Flakes.

Coincidentally with this conversion, Exxon is reintroducing its tiger. The tiger no longer represents just gasoline; now his presence indicates Exxon's sale of the myriad of other products available at each station.

Although the tigers differ in appearance, they are still both tigers. One represents cereal; the other, retail sales of products including cereal.

As you might expect, Kellogg sued Exxon, presumably after attempting to resolve the matter out of court. The federal district court dismissed the case because Kellogg had waited too long to challenge Exxon's tiger, among other reasons.

Waiting too long is called "laches," which is a sort of informal statute of limitations. Laches applies to a trademark dispute when the trademark owner knows about an infringer but chooses not to challenge the infringer. Typically, six years is too long, but the exact time period depends on the circumstances.

In this case, the Exxon tiger had been used for many years, but only recently for retail sales including cereal. Thus, it was not clear that Kellogg had any basis for a suit until recently. Laches would only apply if Kellogg had had a basis for a lawsuit before Exxon started selling cereal. Apparently, the district court felt differently when it dismissed the suit.

District courts do not hear many trademark actions and often apply the standards of infringement incorrectly. This case has been appealed by Kellogg, and I suspect the circuit court may decide things differently. Stay tuned.
