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FRANKLIN INSTITUTE GIVES AWARDS TO 15

Dr. Ambrose Swasey and Prof. Philipp Lenard Receive the Franklin Medals.

PHILADELPHIA, May 18.—Fifteen men of science, five of whom have pursued their researches in foreign countries, were honored for their achievements at the medal day exercises of the Franklin Institute today.

The Franklin Medal, the highest scientific award granted by the institute, was conferred upon Professor Philipp Lenard, director of the Radiological Institute at the University of Heidelberg, and Dr. Ambrose

Swasey of the Warner & Swasey Company, Cleveland.

The award for Dr. Lenard, who was unable to come to this country, was made to Dr. O. C. Kiep, German Consul General in New York City, and a paper by the recipient on "Some Scientific Views" was read by Dr. C. B. Ehwing, a Philadelphia physicist and former fellow-coworker at the University of Bonn.

In a paper on "Astronomers and Their Telescopes," Dr. Swasey, inventor of instruments of precision, told of his work and his relations with astronomers.
