Both of them could be instructed not to let any publisher of a journal see it.

But I would also like to send an advance copy to a French journal (whose editor has urged me to send this matter to him) & to two English journals. If I sent these during the first week in December saying that they must not publish anything before Jan. 1<sup>st</sup> would that be allowable? I believe that the discussion of this paper ~~will be~~ in Europe will be more interesting than that here.

I enclose the tracing of those cuts. There is only one slight correction in Fig. 17. He did a good job.

There is still another small cut Fig 18 for which I sent copy with the last revision of the paper. Please do not forget this.

I do not understand your pencil lines outlining the individual figures. My thought was to have figs 1 & 2 on one block as they come in the early part, & to have all the others in one block, the width of a column, as they all come nearly together in the latter half. This was merely to save cost in cuts & to shorten the paper. Or if you like, it might be cut into two blocks under fig 9, 11 & 10. Or if you prefer, each cut could be separate. All this is entirely up to you as editor.

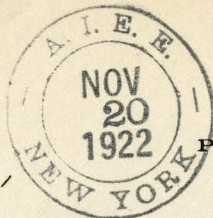
I note your remarks about showing people an advanced proof. I presume the foreign journals can be trusted. It seems certain now that I can count on its appearing in the Jan. issue.

Dear Mr. Metcalf,

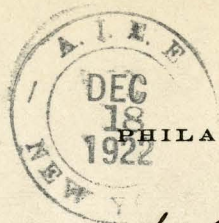
